## Back in Spain! September

After spending the past two years in Canada, we're thankful to be back in Spain! We so enjoyed our time with family and friends, and now we get to enjoy time with our friends and co-workers in Europe! God is so good; giving us relationships around the world provide so much enjoyment and development! He is good, and His generous love endures forever!

The first two weeks of September were spent adjusting to the new time zone, enjoying the warm Spanish sun, and zooming around trying to locate the "right" apartment! It was no easy task to find a place that met our family requirements. We finally settled on a spacious apartment in El Escorial, just 30 minutes north of our former location in Pozuelo. The 4<sup>th</sup> bedroom affords me (Jacob) an office, and the family room provides extra room for guests. El Escorial is an historic location, home to an impressive Monastery, commissioned by King Phillip II. El Escorial also boasts an Evangelical Seminary, SEUT (United Evangelical Theological Seminary), whose director, Pedro Zamora, completed his theological studies in Toronto. Quite interesting!
